# Treasurer's Report for December 2024

As at 31 December 2024 the following funds were held:-

- Heritage Bank General Account \$15,648.35
- Term Deposit (6 months) 4.65% matures 27 May 2025 \$70,000
- MyABF \$22,283

Cash Flow for December shows a net increase of \$15,013,98 due to receipt of \$15,967 Member subscriptions. As you would be aware the membership subscription of \$65 includes annual capitation payments of \$23.30 each to Queensland Bridge Association (QBA) and Australian Bridge Federation (ABF). A new Online Saver Account earning 3.45% interest was opened on 4<sup>th</sup> January with \$13,000. This account will be used for ABF and QBA annual capitation payments due early April.

The QBA is the governing body for duplicate contract bridge in Queensland and is affiliated with the National body, ABF. Primary support for the clubs is provided by the respective State Association, however at a national level, the ABF currently provides affiliated clubs with the following benefits:

- Insurance policies which cover affiliated clubs for Director's and Officer's Insurance.
- Voluntary Workers Insurance;
- Public Liability Insurance;
- Access to offers from National Sponsors;
- Access to Teacher Training Programs;
- Access to National Marketing support programs;
- Free ABF Newsletter.

The following motion was carried at the committee meeting held on 12<sup>th</sup> December 2024. "The free game vouchers (including birthdays and volunteers) are to be discontinued and from the new calendar year 2025 no further vouchers to be printed. Birthday cards to be discontinued from 1<sup>st</sup> January." Club members will still enjoy a Christmas event at the end of the year provided by the Club.

I am happy to advise Ergon has replaced our faulty meter, which has resulted in adjusted energy bills for the period 28/04/2024 to 28/11/2024 and generating a credit of \$697.73. Our electricity bill for the month ending 28/12/2024 was \$17.03. A refund for the \$680.70 has been received.

# A LITTLE BIT OF BRIDGE HISTORY The Yarborough



Charles Anderson Worsley Anderson-Pelham, 2<sup>nd</sup> Earl of Yarborough (12 April 1809 – 7 January 1862) was a British nobleman who succeeded to the Earldom of Yarborough in 1846.

Before his accession, he was the Member of Parliament (MP) for Newtown 1830-1831, Lincolnshire 1831-1832 and North Linconshire 1835-1846.

Lord Yarborough gave his name to a hand of cards dealt in contract bridge that has no card higher than a nine. The probability of getting a Yarborough is:

$$\frac{\binom{32}{13}}{\binom{52}{13}}$$
 which is  $\frac{347,373,600}{635,013,559,600}$  or about  $\frac{1}{1828}$ 

The Earl offered £1,000 to anyone who achieved a "Yarborough" on condition they paid him £1 each time they did not succeed.

# The Beer Card

In trick-taking card games such as bridge, the beer card is a name informally given to the seven of diamonds  $(7 \spadesuit)$ . Players may agree that if a player wins the last trick of a hand with the  $7 \spadesuit$ , their partner must buy them a beer. This is not considered as part of the rules, but is an optional and informal side-bet between players. This practice likely originates from Danish Tarok or Skat in the middle of the  $20^{th}$  century. In most decks, the  $7 \spadesuit$  is the only diamond number card that lacks rotational symmetry.

For declarer, the requirements are generally that:

- He must make the contract (exceptions may be made for a successful sacrifice)
- Diamonds must not be trumps (though some people play that only diamond partscores, and not games or slams, are excluded)
- He must take a justifiable line to win as many tricks as possible

For a defender, the requirements are generally that:

- The contract must be defeated
- Diamonds must not be trumps (though some people play that doubled contracts are excluded)
- She and her partner must try to win as many tricks as possible

#### Additional Rules:

The beer card may be won on the first trick; if that does occur, a case of beer is owed to the declarer/defender who won said trick.

# **Club Prize for First Yarborough**

Here's a suggestion for the Committee – what about putting up \$100 (cash) as a prize for the first member to recognize they have a yarborough hand. And let's test the odds. I thought I had one on Wednesday 16<sup>th</sup> January, when South's hand on board 19 was the following:



However, I didn't realise that 10's were counted as minor honour cards. And given that the hands rotate around the room, it would be the first person who recognizes the board for what it is.

However, someone may have a better suggestion – over to you.



# 6 MONTHS USAGE OF SOLAR PANELS AND BATTERY

We have received an Ergon account for the period 28/11/24 to 28/12/24. It shows that we imported from the grid 604 kwh and exported 2047.74 for the same period. For this usage, we were billed \$221, while the solar feed in earned \$253. Our bill was not quite in overall credit due to the Service charge of \$49.43, but it was a pretty good result.

Both the panels (Enphase) and the battery (Tesla) come with software which meters the power flows both in and out, but not with quite the same accuracy as the Ergon meter. Both the apps show the figures of 561 and 2154 for the same period, which are reasonably concordant with the Ergon figures. The software shows we **used** a total of 2271.4 over the same period which means we did not have to pay for 1709.9 kwh which came direct from the solar system.

Our savings for one month, therefore, are  $1709.9 \times 0.33264$  (current tariff 11) = \$568.79 +  $2047 \times 0.12377$  (current feed-in) = \$253.35 = Total \$822.31. Say \$750 approximately.

The same calculation for the last 6 months using the app shows a saving of \$3976. Even assuming a 10% inaccuracy in our favour, the figures show a saving of approximately \$7150 per year which seems a very acceptable number. Our actual Ergon bill for the last 6 months was close to \$1400. We earned \$1200 from feed in and paid \$351 as service charge, leaving a nett cost for electricity of \$550 - down from close to \$11,000 in 2018. If looking for these figures in the club financial reports, you will find the feed-in income reported separately from the consumption.

I will continue to monitor their performance and look forward to providing an annual report.

# **Winners are Grinners**

The "Monthly Winners" are recognised as the "individual" winner of <u>eclectic</u> multi-session events. These events combine of all the green masterpoint sessions in a month that have not already counted toward a competition. If there are three available sessions then your best two scores are counted (shows as 2/3), if there are four available sessions then your best three scores are counted (3/4) and if there are five available sessions then your best four scores might be counted (4/5). If there are two available sessions, then they are treated as an eclectic event (best 2/2). If there are five days in the month, then we usually combine two of these (see the bridge diary) as a "<u>Two-Weekly</u>" and additional masterpoints are awarded to the top half of those whose partnerships played both days. The remaining three days are scored as an eclectic with (2/3).

# **Date Claimers**

- Club Teams Championship: Saturday 16<sup>th</sup> February (two sessions). There will be an Open and a Restricted/Novice section. Also, we are going to try a new event specifically for our Rookies (new players, those straight out of lessons and up to 10 masterpoints). It will be a one session event (eg just the afternoon) and I have called it a **Perfect Teams** event, where four friends nominate as a team and they will play three matches in the afternoon, playing one match with each team member. We will make sure there is plenty of support onsite to help you, but you will be playing normal bridge with your peers and will be gaining some experience in a teams environment. Please support this new initiative.
- **GNOT** (**Grand National Open Teams**): Friday afternoons 21<sup>st</sup> & 28<sup>th</sup> February. Nominate a team of four, five or six players to play in this club event. If someone can't play both weeks you may use other people/or pairs provided you do not exceed six in total. The GNOT is run by the ABF for members of clubs all around Australia and is the only event where you can earn gold masterpoints playing in your own club against your peers. There are about 1700 teams (7000 players) that start this event making it one of the largest in the world.

The winners of this club heat earn the right to advance to the Zone Final (against top teams from the other participating clubs in our zone – Darling Downs, Dalby, Warwick, Stanthorpe, Roma, Lockyer, Goondiwindi). The top two teams from our zone final earn the right to advance to the "Round of 64" in September and the top 4 teams after that play in the national final in Sydney in November.

- **Patron's Day:** Saturday 1<sup>st</sup> March.
  - This is a two-session event for all club members. It is divided into three grades with prize recognition for the winners in each grade. Details follow soon.
  - The winners of the Open section are also recognised as the winners of the Clive Berghofer Pairs.
- **Ivy Dahler Cup:** Three Monday afternoons 3<sup>rd</sup>, 10<sup>th</sup> & 17<sup>th</sup> March for red masterpoints. The field will be divided into two grades (Open and Novice). Actual format depends on the number of entries but will involve on session of qualifying. The top 12 pairs in each grade then play in a two-session final whilst the remaining pairs play regular bridge (still for red masterpoints).
- Tuesday Night Pairs Competition: 18th & 25th March for red masterpoints.
- Toowoomba Butler Pairs congress: Sunday 23<sup>rd</sup> March.

All these events are listed on our website in the "Calendar" area, are usually listed on the website front page, often have a flyer on display in the clubrooms, and are announced by the Directors (should be at the start of each session). They are also mentioned on the TV announcements when these TV's are switched on. Despite this, word of mouth remains the best way to get people involved, so always make sure you gee-up your friends to play  $\bigcirc$


Isabella Geldard

Formerly from Chinchilla where we had a supermarket and raised our 3 children. Now have 11 grandkids and 2 great grandies.


I started bridge in 2008 but have played intermittently, mainly because of working and long holidays.
