

Treasurer's Report

As at the end of February 2015, the club had \$6,856.02 in the Congress account and \$37,055.80 in the General account. Out of these funds, we do have to pay all your ABF and QBA levies at the end of March (approx \$9,800) and there are always bills in the pipeline to pay (just like at home).

Significant expenses over the past three months have included:

Printing/binding of 480 bridge diaries	\$481.00
Printing 1,000 brochures	\$428.00
Printing 72,000 bidding slips	\$599.00
Clean and modify underground tanks	\$990.00
Additional tiles outside kitchen	\$584.61
New microwave oven	\$148.00
Replacement cordless vacuum	\$239.00
Repair Dishwasher	\$228.00
Honorariums	\$5,280.00
Electricity bill to end Feb (7,523 kW)	\$2,092.31
Council rates – six months	\$2,223.06

Our "sinking fund" is spread over three term deposts with Heritage Bank with a total balance of \$116,666.19. This fund is to cover future expenses such as repainting, replacing carpets, carpark repairs, replacing air-conditioners, etc.

Overall, our club continues to do well in providing excellent playing facilities for the game we all love so much.

Masterpoint Secretary's Report

It's sad that masterpoints are all about numbers, when it really should be a celebration of how well you have played. So if you earned any masterpoints over the past six months, I congratulate you!!!

Anyway, I do have to talk about numbers in this report. It has been six months since the last ABF masterpoint census date (end of September), and the total number of tables played, and green and red masterpoints awarded, are listed in the following table:

March was our busiest month ever, with 472 tables, well exceeding the previous record of 425.5 tables in March 2012. These numbers include club competitions but not congresses, which are counted separately. Our monthly table numbers vary quite a bit depending on how many competitions are held, and depending on whether there are five Mondays, Wednesdays or Thursdays in the month.

Remember, at the club level you win masterpoints for placing in the top half of the field. The winner gets:

- 0.03 green x No of Tables in a Mitchell movement
- 0.06 green x No of Tables in a Howell movement
- 0.05 red x No of Tables in a Mitchell movement
- 0.10 red x No of Tables in a Howell movement

In all cases, 2nd place gets 70% of the winner award, 3rd place gets ½, 4th place gets 1/3, 5th place gets ¼ and this continues for all the top half of the field.

If you are on the quest for more red masterpoints, then consider playing in all the club competitions and local congresses.

The Novice Pairs Congress, May 3rd 2015

All club members who classify as novices should make every effort to play in this Congress. Not as a duty to the club, but as an enjoyable event where you can front up with your partner knowing full well that you are not lambs to the slaughter. Yes, some people on the day will play better than you, but a lot of people on the day will play worse than you.

The first round of a congress is seeded (we have to start somewhere), and from thereon in you will be playing against the pair who scored closest to you during the played round.

If you are having a bad round, don't worry, you will be drawn against someone else who is having a similar slice of luck. If you are playing well at the time, then so will your opponents. Better still, you can never be drawn against the same opponents twice!!

I've been checking out attendances for the Novice Pairs congresses we have held in Toowoomba recently, and our club attendances are great. We have averaged 24 tables per year for the last three years. (I've actually seen novice congresses in Brisbane where the event has been cancelled due to lack of entries.)

When you consider that between 71% and 74% of all members of our club are Novice players, and that many of these same players you may play against on a Monday morning, or a Wednesday morning or even a Thursday night, then have a good laugh!! You've most likely beat them before and you can surely beat them again.

Remember, a Congress is for fun; you will play against people from other clubs and in all likelihood, other cities.

The Toowoomba Novice Pairs Congress is an event run to put our clubs' face on the map and to have people come to the Toowoomba Bridge Club and leave with pleasant memories, but hopefully, no prize money!

The Novice Congress is just like a ladder, once you start climbing and see what is at the top, you just want to keep climbing, and ALL OF US had to start as Novices.

From the Bridge Diary

Here is more information for our newer members on how club competitions run and what the significance is of the name of some events.

Ivy Dahler Novice Pairs

I mentioned Ivy Dahler in our last newsletter and gave a brief summary of her significant performances as a bridge player, Director and bridge administrator. Ivy also gave much of her time to teaching and in acknowledgement of this, the club runs two competitions for newer players.

On 13th and 20th April we run the <u>Ivy Dahler Novice Pairs</u> competition. This is a regular pairs competition run over two Monday afternoon sessions. The ideal situation is that everyone plays in both sessions and then your scores from each session are added together. It is restricted to players with fewer than 50 masterpoints. Why not come along and give it a try – see if you can better last year's winners: Geoff Buckham and David Edwards. It is a club competition, but you'll just be playing pairs as normal.

Teams of Three

A team's event is played similar to regular pairs – you are dealt cards, you bid for a contract and you play to make the contract. The method of scoring is different. Your score is compared to one other table only ... your opponents. It does not matter what happens in the rest of the room.

Key tactics in teams scoring is to make sure you always make your contract. There is very little reward for one overtrick, so you never risk a contract like you might in regular pairs. Many players (including myself) prefer teams events.

Our <u>Teams of Three</u> event is run in two grades; one for "rookies" (players with fewer than 10 masterpoints) and one for "novices" (players with fewer than 150 masterpoints). In both cases, three players are assigned a more experienced "captain" (some call them an "expert") who will show their team what to do. You play three matches, and the captain will play one match with each of your teammates.

Club Teams Championship

On Sunday 26th April a new club event will run for the first time ... the **Toowoomba Bridge Club Teams Championship**. This is a two session red masterpoint event. Session one starts at 9:30am,

so we need your team seated and ready to play by 9:15. BYO Lunch and a plate to share.

The actual format of the event will depend on the number of entries: a round robin or a swiss movement. If there are sufficient entries then there will also be category prizes (eg for all novice team members). Entry fee is \$40 per team.

Clive Berghofer Pairs

Clive Berghofer AM, is Patron of the Toowoomba Bridge Club and has been a significant supporter of us over many years. As Mayor of Toowoomba, Clive was instrumental in Council granting a lease to the Toowoomba Bridge Club for our land in Water Street. This was the first such action by a local Council in Queensland. When rezoning forced us to vacate Water Street and to build our new clubrooms here on Stuart Street, through his company, Clive Berghofer Developments, Clive assisted us again by doing all the site/earthworks for free and then donated the two air-conditioning systems.

The <u>Clive Berghofer Pairs</u> competition is a three session event that runs over consecutive Saturday afternoons: 9th, 16th and 23rd May – for red masterpoints. As the name suggests, it is a regular duplicate pairs competition where your results are added together over the three sessions. You are allowed one substitute player if someone is sick one of the weeks.

Joyce Benson Cup

Joyce Benson's duplicate bridge career started in 1960 when she agreed to play in Toowoomba (and Australia's) first Bridge Congress. Since those early days, Joyce was consistently a significant contributor to the bridge scene in Toowoomba over many years as a player, Director and teacher. This was recognised when Joyce was appointed the first Life Member of the Toowoomba Bridge Club in 1982.

By 2007, with her eyesight failing, Joyce eventually had to give up the game she loved, but she continued to teach bridge from her home. You will find many people in the club who learnt their bridge with Joyce, and many still have a copy of her notes "The Joy(ce) of Bridge".

The <u>Joyce Benson Cup</u> is a red masterpoint three session pairs event that runs on three Wednesdays (10th, 17th and 24th June). Joyce had been Director of the Wednesday session for many years and this is a fitting tribute in her memory. Walk-in pairs

are welcome but you maximise your chances for red masterpoints by playing in all three sessions – one substitute is allowed.

Ivy Dahler Novice Teams

Run on two Monday afternoons (15th and 22nd June) and restricted to players with fewer than 50 masterpoints. Prior entry is required, but we will help get people into teams if requested.

Presidents Cup

This is a regular pairs competition run over three Tuesday Nights (16th, 23rd and 30th June). Scores are accumulated and one substitute is allowed. For interest, a list of Presidents of the Toowoomba Bridge Club are listed below:

BRIDGE CLUB PROPERTY RIGHTS

Unfortunately, we have had an incident over the last month where a person has come onto our land and told us he can come onto our property any time he likes, take what he likes, and we can't do anything about it because his wife is a policewoman.

Over the last seven years, a lot of people have come onto our property and used our car park when walking their dogs, and we have no problem with that (as long as they control their dogs). People have also helped themselves to our avocados and we couldn't care less - good luck to them. But to come onto our property with a ladder to fill buckets with avocados and tell our members they can do what they like because the wife is a police officer and for our members to go away and play their silly game, is not quite the same. Then to repeat that three weeks in a row, ignoring our President who approached them and told him to leave the second week and then to slap one of our members on the wrist the third week something had to be done. The police have now told the husband and wife they are not to come on our property again but if they do, we are to let them know.

So what are our rights? The Council have confirmed that the Toowoomba Bridge Club Inc has control of access, use, exclusion and management of our land subject to any conditions in our lease. The only condition that applies to us is we cannot remove any of the trees without Council approval.

There is also the problem of who would be legally liable should someone bring a ladder onto our property and then fall off it injuring themselves. This is the reason why any contractors have to have their own insurance before they can do any work on our building.

However because of the position of our entry into the club, it may be in our own interests to give left hand or right hand signals in plenty of time before such entry or exit.

Club Teacher Report

Your Lead By Edwin Willey

As West with Spades - AQT, Hearts - KQ75, Diamonds - J32, Clubs - T83, you hear this bold uninterrupted auction:

Your confident double is passed out. You lead HK and dummy is laid down: SKJ96 HAJ64 D75 CQ94. Declarer calls for HA and ruffs the H4 continuation.

Your double looks decidedly shaky. Declarer leads S5 at Trick 3. What do you do now? Sadly, it is all too late. There is no way of preventing declarer getting a second H ruff to make the contract via 2 spades, 1 heart, 2 heart ruffs, 4 diamonds, 1 diamond ruff and 2 clubs.

The critical aspect of this deal is that the only way to reach dummy for the second heart ruff is via trumps. So the way to defeat this wafer thin contract is to draw declarer's trump. The way to do this is to lead EITHER SA followed by SQ or ST at tricks one and two (this gives declarer the entry to dummy for the second H ruff, but at the expense of his last trump), OR leading SQ or ST and rising with the SA when declarer attempts to reach dummy to playing a third round of trump, thus exhausting declarer's trumps.

The bizarre need to make such absolutely unthinkable and crazy initial leads shows that there is always hope for careless play. Mind you most times the HK lead will be right.

The hand occurred over 50 years ago in a casual rubber game. As South, I make no excuse for my bidding, but I do smile at my partner's youthful initiative. I was a mature twenty-five.

Club Championships 2015

The November **TBC** 2014 Newsletter contained an unacknowledged article presenting argument for establishing new TBC Pairs and Teams Championships. The first two paragraphs of this item contain errors and implications requiring correction. These two paragraphs are reproduced below. The article then uses these facts to argue the reorganization the club's major events.

By 1981, three Bridge-playing clubs in nights, Toowoomba (Tuesday Friday afternoons and afternoons Wednesday as in the article)) merged to form the new Toowoomba Bridge Club. The prior establishment of the Toowoomba Bridge Club in 1959 was recognized in the name of the new amalgamated club. The older club had met on Wednesday evenings; the second oldest met on Thursday afternoons. The proximity of these two sessions in the week led to negotiation between the two clubs in the late 1970s; the result – the Wednesday evening session moved to Tuesday evenings.

To imply that each of the original clubs was the fiefdom of a particular person is far from true. When Bruce Meakins and I played in the Toowoomba Bridge Club Pairs Championship in 1972, we were not playing in the Col Martin Pairs Championship. To advocate that with the passing of Joyce Benson, Col Martin or Ivy Dahler, these events can be put into the melting pot seems self-serving.

It appears sad to suggest that the reason for retaining the two honour boards was because both Ivy Dahler and Col Martin were still alive. In my forty-five years as member the club, whether on committee or not, I never felt any of the issues implied by the wording of the article. Both were forthright individuals, but neither claimed proprietary rights on any session; and in fact, in retirement, Col directed on both Tuesday and Thursday.

The honour boards were established as a natural flow-on from the events already played both on Tuesday evenings and on Thursday afternoons. The 1981 and subsequent programme books of our Club provide valuable information on these issues. Championship events on Tuesday evening and Thursday afternoon were held over four or five sessions. Thus, the creation of brand new club championships played over two sessions appears a retrograde step.

The statement that "these (board) event have been *limited* (my italics) to very few participants" seems odd, when they have always been in the TBC Programme Books, and there has never ever been any attempt to restrict entry to them.

I have no objection to objective discussion on the club programme. Yet one has to be concerned that *facts* and *arguments* like these have informed discussion and any decision on club major events.

Revisionism is to be feared. And as I said at the AGM, there appears to be a committee reinventing the TBC traditions. However, revisionism ought not to be the chief handmaiden of the new tradition.

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When The Toowoomba Bridge Club Inc was established in 1982 with the amalgamation of three Bridge Clubs; the Downs Club, the City Club and the Toowoomba Bridge Club, to some degree they tried to keep their own identity by having different Club Championships. Ivy Dahler's day was Thursday, Col Martin's was Tuesday night and Joyce Benson ran Wednesday encouraging her beginners to come. And while Ivy and Col were alive, there was no way in the world they would consider having a single Club Championship. This explains why we have two honour boards – one for Tuesday night and one for Thursday.

This has been a bone of contention for many of us who, while we acknowledge the wonderful contribution Col and Ivy made to the club, felt that having two club championships was rather silly. Plus, these events have become limited to very few participants.

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
