ADVICE TO NEW PLAYERS From AUSTRALIAN BRIDGE FEDERATION

Phew..... finally you finish your beginner's course.....what now? We don't tell you that a bridge course is not actually just 6 or 8 lessons, but really you've started on a path for a lifetime that will give you pleasure provided you keep at it. NOW is the time to put all your hard learned facts together and practice. Most clubs offer Help with Play or supervised sessions, where you are able to play hands and ask for help when needed. You will probably stay in these for a few months, and really you should play more than once a week. DON'T let experienced players confuse you if they start telling you too much. You only need what you've learned in beginner's lessons at this stage, and you need to consolidate it. Slowly but surely the fog will lift, and although sometimes you don't feel you're getting anywhere, you really are. Bridge is a big journey, to be taken in small steps. There will be people at the bridge club to help you along the way, but you and your bridge partner can work together a lot too. Understanding your partner at the bridge table (your best friend during the game) is the key to success.

TIPS ON BRIDGE ETIQUETTE

If you encounter improper behaviour at the table, you should alert the session/competition director so that appropriate action can be taken.

A player is not allowed to touch a card held by another player. Even when the game is over, it is illegal to touch the cards of another player.

After the play of a hand is over, do not take an opponent's cards and look at them without asking permission.

During the session, conserve your energies to do battle at the next table. It is extremely poor taste (and a breach of etiquette) to abuse or criticise either your partner or an opponent.

When you are dummy, it is poor form to look at either opponent's hand or at declarer's. If you do, you lose your rights as dummy.

Never let a harsh word pass your lips and you will be a sought-after rather than a shunned partner. Never try to teach anyone at the table.

Conversations at the table during a game are generally unwelcome. Post-mortems after each hand, if limited, can be useful as long as they are constructive. The best way to develop your game with your partner is to keep a hand record and go over 'problems' with your partner after the session. This is not only a good thing in that it prevents 'blaming partner' at the table (and thus potentially humiliating them publicly), but it improves your communications in bidding.

When attending any club session ensure that you arrive at least 15 - 20 minutes before start of play. This will enable the director to determine the most appropriate 'movement' based on the number of players at the session. Late arrivals, if allowed to stay, will cause a delay in the start of play.

TEACHING REPORT

DATE CLAIMER:

There will be a new beginner course starting on Wednesday morning, the beginning of September. If members have any friends who have shown an interest in learning bridge, could you let them know and they can contact Trudy or Glenys for details.

NEW FORMAT:

The new format for day and evening classes seems to be well received and working well. Denise Hartwig has repeated the 8 beginner lessons before taking her class onto the last 6 lessons. Because there is no separate beginner Supervised in the evening, this has enabled her class to get a better understanding of the basics.

With the Day Classes, after the first 8 lessons, four weeks were spent on tips for playing the cards as well as reinforcing the basics. This has been followed by a new format for the last 6 lessons where each lesson has been followed by a Supervised Play which has incorporated some hands from the previous week. The downside on this means it takes longer but the feedback to date has been pretty positive. In September, all the lessons will be repeated to give the present class a chance to reinforce all the basics. Anyone starting lessons for the first time then, will be encouraged to redo the lessons again next year and come to Supervised Play. Bearing in mind that most people learn bridge purely for social reasons, as long as you have a good understanding of the basic principles of bidding, you don't need all the fandangled extra conventions to play a perfectly good game of bridge. That is for later after you have the basics under control and only if you want to. Glenys Clift

HOW TO CONFUSE BEGINNERS

The latest bit of so called "good advice" being given to beginners is to bid 1D with less than 5/6 points as a holding bid after their partner has opened 1C. Apparently the reasoning goes that rather than being left in 1C if everyone passes, it gives them a chance to bid something. Irrespective of whether you play Better Minors or open Short Club NO BRIDGE TEACHER ANYWHERE IN THE WORLD, would introduce this concept to beginners. When I asked the best player in our club, Adrian Mayers would he play this at his level – his answer was:

"ABSOLUTELY NOT". The only system they play this is in Precision where their 1C opening is their strongest opening bid showing at least 16 points or a 4-loser and 1D is the equivalent of a weak waiting bid.

A couple of years ago, beginners were told that playing Weak Twos was all the go and their only strong bid was 2C. The only problem was a few pointers got lost in translation. To open 2C with weak Twos you need to have a game force hand or 23 HCP. You virtually are playing opening at the 1-level with 12 -22.

And please, do not tell beginners that opening 1NT with a 5-card major is the way to go. It is a very good system for players who have all the basics under control and have been playing for a while but it involves a lot more than just showing 5-card major. The responses are very different to what most people play and the transfers are slightly different to Jacoby transfers. Ho hum. Glenys Clift

Social Bridge

An interesting discussion emerged a few weeks ago.

You might have noticed that in our Bridge Diary sessions that are not part of a competition are labelled as "Social". We also run a number of "Supervised Play" or "Restricted Sessions".

We play duplicate bridge which means that, in order, the 2007 Laws of Duplicate Bridge, QBA Tournament Regulations and Toowoomba Bridge Club By-Laws and any published Tournament Regulations apply. Congresses, Competitions, Social, Graded and Restricted sessions all follow the same rules and regulations But there can be a slightly different approach, which I will explain below.

From the "Introduction to the 2007 Laws of Duplicate Bridge" come the following definitions - which the Laws explicitly state form part of these laws:

"may"	failure to do it is not wrong	
"does"	establishes correct procedure without	4
	suggesting that violation be penalised	4
"should"	failure to do so is an infraction that	4
	jeopardises the rights of the infractor but	4
	often not penalised	1
"shall"	a violation will incur a procedural	4
	penalty more often than not	1
"must"	the strongest word - a serious matter	
"must not"	the strongest prohibition.	

SOCIAL BRIDGE

There is no such game as "social bridge". We just play bridge, and the Laws apply to everyone.

However, I would expect that in a "social" session that the Director will be more gentle and will understand that not all players are experienced and thus they may not know the correct procedure in all situations. Thus, we apply the laws ... but gently.

In regular sessions, major competitions and congresses, it is reasonable to expect that all players have an understanding of correct procedure and thus we (whilst still being nice) should apply the laws pertaining to correct procedure more.

COVERING THE BIDDING SLIP

Covering the bidding slip is needed to follow correct procedure established by Law 20C2 which uses "**may**" as in "may at his first turn to play, require all previous calls to be restated". So we expect people to do this but if all four at the table don't bother then there is often no problem with leaving the slip exposed.

However, the QBA Regulations make this Law come true by stating that the bidding slip should be covered when the second defender plays - the regulation says "**should**" which means it is an infraction that jeopardises the rights of the infractor (usually a defender).

If all four players are happy to leave the bidding slip exposed then they are not following correct procedure but I do not see it as being a problem worthy of capital punishment. However, if there is a later complaint that a defender chose to lead a card because they could see the bidding slip, then we would have to consider via Law 16 whether this **extraneous information** affected the choice of lead, and if so, we might rule against the offender. There is still no punishment, we are just restoring equity. This is why we, as Directors and senior players, should stress that everyone follows correct procedure and why we should lead by example and cover the bidding slip automatically. If I arrive at a table where one player has highlighted that the table has not followed correct procedure (eg cover the bidding slip) but they want to, then I would support that player and tell the table to cover. If they then refuse to follow a Director instruction, then we consider a few more reminders and ultimately must act with a Procedural Penalty.

DISPLAY CARDS IN ORDERLY MANNER

We see many disputes at the club that appear to arise because players don't acquit their tricks correctly. Law 65C tells us "Each player arranges his own cards in an orderly overlapping row in the sequence played, so as to permit review of the play after its completion, if necessary to determine the number of tricks won by each side or the order in which the cards were played".

Law 65D continues "A player **should not** disturb the order of his played cards until agreement has been reached on the number of tricks won. A player who fails to comply with the provisions of this Law jeopardises his right to claim ownership of doubtful tricks or to claim (or deny) a revoke.

Again, we see it would be rare in club play to apply a penalty to someone who muddles up their cards before all players have agreed to the number of tricks ... but if there is any later dispute the Director will most likely decide in favour of the other side.

WHO CAN TOUCH THE BIDDING SLIPS?

This is an easy answer and also a hard one. Obviously anyone, when it is their turn to bid!

NS as the stationary pair in most sessions are primarily responsible for the table so they touch the bidding slip first and last. If EW want to keep the bidding slip after the hand is over, then that is fine. If both NS and EW want to keep the bidding slip, then they need to come to some arrangement amongst themselves. If they can't then they need to go back to kindergarten.

Otherwise the Laws and Regulations say NS prevail and my common sense suggestion is for EW to keep a little notebook with you and reproduce the auction there.

ARE WE ALLOWED TO WRITE ON THE BIDDING SLIPS TO TEACH AN IDEA?

NO. There should be no teaching at the table.

DUMMY PLAYS THE CARDS

Law 45 F covers this with a "may not", but it does say that if Dummy touches or indicates a card then the Director **shall** be summonsed (remember "shall" is quite strict). At the end of play, the Director shall award an adjusted score if he considers dummy suggested a line of play to Declarer *and* the Defenders were damaged by the play suggested.

SUPERVISED PLAY

Supervised Play sessions are permitted via Law 40C3(a) which states "Unless permitted by the Regulating Authority a player is not entitled during the auction and play periods to any aids to his memory, calculation or technique. As the Regulating Authority, the Toowoomba Bridge Club has given permission via this Law so that players can look at their notes, ask for help, etc. The ABF Masterpoint Scheme permits such contests but masterpoints awards are at a reduced rate.

Treasurers Report

As at the end of June 2016, the club had \$ 43,083.80 in the General account \$ 7,635.10 in the Congress account \$ 57,452.36 in Term Deposit 1 \$ 11,409.87 in Term Deposit 2 \$ 52,699.96 in Term Deposit 3 For a total of \$172,281.09 "in the bank".

The term deposits are a sinking fund to pay for future repairs and associated works. Our book value "depreciation" is \$199,856.00 for the building, \$39,228.00 for furniture and equipment and \$59,336.00 for fixtures and fittings. Our building depreciation is determined at double the normal rate to take into \blacklozenge account our potential 20-year lease. Our sinking funds cover the depreciation of furniture, equipment, fixtures and fittings - so we are in good shape provided we continue as we have over the past few years. There will come a time when we have to replace the carpet, repaint the building and roof, re-pave the carpark, replace the air-conditioning and ventilation system; and we and future Management Committees must always keep enough in reserve to cover the worst case scenario.

In the 11 months thus far of our financial year, our total income has been \$138,876.23 and total expenses have been \$111,549.99.

Safety Issue

Parking at the club is becoming a safety issue. Although we have 63 parking spaces, these are filled on Monday afternoon and often on Congress days.

On the days when the car park is full, members need to be aware that there are some areas that they should not use for safety reasons and the club has a duty of care to alert members to this.

Members should not park in areas other than in parking bays designated by two white lines or two lines of white discs and their vehicle should be between the lines and not overlapping two bays.

The grassed area on the South West section of the building is not part of the car park and should not be used as such.

Parking in the following areas in particular will result in the partial blocking of lanes for traffic movement and/or lines of sight for drivers.

- A. The small area to the west of the avocado tree. A car parked in this area will have its rear partially blocking the path of vehicles moving from parking spaces to the west and south of that area.
- B. The area to the West of the Jacaranda tree at the front of the block as this impedes the vision of drivers entering the car park and partially blocks the passage for traffic in and out of the car park.
- C. The council strip to the South of the entrance as in doing so, departing drivers have their vision impeded thus creating a potentially dangerous situation.

Council has also specified that vehicles parked on the verge north of our block should be parallel parked not angle parked and it is possible that Council traffic infringement notices may be issued to members who are angle parked.

I ask members to consider the above when using the car park as we are not in a position to increase the number of parking spaces available and we do not want accidents occurring in our car park.

One way of reducing the pressure on our parking is for members to increase carpooling thus reducing the number of vehicles on the site. Please consider this.
