President's Report



At the club's Annual General Meeting on the 13th October, our new Management Committee was elected with me as President, Larraine Sutton continuing as Treasurer, and Glenys Clift, Keith Jenkin and Hugh Robinson continuing as Committee Members. We welcome Lesley

Meyer as Secretary, and Jan Lindau, Shaunagh Cowell, Ian Steger and George McKinnon as Committee Members. Keith has also taken on the role of Providor, Hugh as Congress Convenor and Annette Sullivan as Masterpoint Secretary. This mix of experienced and new faces on the Management Committee is good for a large and growing club such as ours. Already we have seen many good ideas developed and introduced and existing practices further refined. We wish to make our management processes as streamlined as we can and our bridge as enjoyable as possible for all members.

Floyd Wilson, Bruce Hinchliffe, Gabrielle Ehlich, Robbie Fulton, Byron Longford and Glennis Cowell retired from the positions of President, Vice-President, Secretary and Committee Members respectively. All have made excellent contributions to the management of our club, and we thank them for all their good work.

Unfortunately, I was not in attendance at the AGM because 15 months earlier (before our AGM date was set) I had accepted appointment as Director of the Tenterfield Bridge Club Swiss Pairs Congress. Nonetheless, I was following most of the AGM proceedings via txt messages and heard that it included some spirited discussion at times. It is important that all members get a say and are treated fairly, and that we openly discuss things and then we must all pull together as a team to work for the common good of the club membership

At the AGM, members approved adoption of the new Association Rules (still called Constitution by many)

so that they are consistent with the Incorporated Associations Act, and better reflect the way the club operates. These Association Rules have now been sent to the Office of Fair Trading for final ratification. Once this is done, all members will be advised of the start date of the new rules via the club website, noticeboards and Directors announcements.

The issue of catering for regular club sessions was again discussed at the AGM through a member's letter. The Management Committee has carefully considered the issues raised at the AGM, particularly in relation to the club finances, volunteer workload and equity amongst all sessions. For these reasons, the committee endorses the decision of the 2012 Management Committee that there will be no paid hostess service for any session and no systemic provision of sandwiches. As Providore, Keith has come up with some good ways to ensure members have access to sweet or savoury snacks with their afternoon tea, and we all support him in these initiatives.

I am deeply honoured to have been elected as a Life Member of this great club, and I thank the great number of people who proposed me, and especially those who support and encourage me throughout the year.

Finally, I'd like to express a word of thanks to all of the volunteers of the club who; deal boards for each session, direct sessions of bridge, help the Director prepare the room and kitchen before play, clean up the room after play, look after the gardens, clean the gutters, water the gardens, trim the hedges, help with the restricted and supervised play sessions, replenish the table supplies, sharpen pencils, wash the tablecloths, spot clean as required, and the dozens of other important jobs that I have not mentioned. The club runs as well as it does, and we all get to enjoy our bridge, because of your efforts. **So, well done and thank you**!!!

I took over this role after the AGM in October and hope that I can carry on the fine tradition that Chris Snook has established and continued for the past many years.

As at the ABF Census date of 30 September 2012, we had processed 1,895.72 green masterpoints for the year. This is an increase of 99.03 over the previous 12 months. There was also an increase of 38.66 red masterpoints processed for the year. Obviously, we are all enjoying playing bridge, and lots more of it.

Since then, I have processed 299.09 green masterpoints for October and November, and 52.30 red masterpoints.

You can do this on the club computers at any time. If you feel that you are missing some masterpoints, check with the Club Masterpoint Secretary in the first instance.

Mentoring Scheme?

I received a letter from one member who wished to raise an issue at the AGM but was not able to because of the time spent on other matters. It is an issue that I have a lot of empathy with, but I do not have a clear answer yet.

Most of our stronger players tend to play in established partnerships with other strong players. Thus they tend to place highly in most events at the club. It is not deliberately a closed shop, but could be viewed as such. The Tuesday Night and Thursday Singles are prime examples of this, but it occurs in regular sessions each week of the year. It has been suggested that newer players will improve if they play with the "better" players, but how do we make this happen?

We cannot mandate that player X must play with player Y – after all, X might just stop coming.

We have tried Teams of Three days (which I will do again next year); and a few other events but they do not seem to have the desired effect. I'll keep trying.

We designate one day per month as Invitation Days on Wednesday and Friday – and expect that you will play with someone who is not your regular partner. This is also a good social arrangement to get us to play with other club members. We do not see a lot of strong/new partnerships on these days, and will encourage this more next year.

To try and get the ball moving, I will arrange for two lists to be displayed on the club noticeboard. One for stronger players who are willing to share some of their time (say one day a month??) and one for newer players who are keen to improve their game. We will allow the members themselves to establish initial contact. Please support this new initiative.

If we see a lot of support for this, then we may try a more formal arrangement in the future.

TEACHING PROGRAM FOR 2013

Our club is extremely fortunate in that we have a very dedicated teaching team who are willing to give their time and energy in organising lessons, supervised play and workshops. The team comprises Liz Zeller, Henry Eastment, Trudy Dunne, Ian Jesser and Glenys Clift with Barbara Power and Peg Alcock assisting.

The following is the proposed teaching program for 2013. New on the agenda are Intermediate Lessons to be run by Liz Zeller. Programs for all the classes and workshops will be published in the New Year in the newsletter and on the web.

BEGINNER CLASSES:

Wednesday Morning starting 6th March, 2013 9am – 11.30am with Trudy Dunne.

Thursday Evening starting 7th March, 2013 7pm – 9.30pm with Glenys Clift.

The first 8 classes are designed to introduce new players to the etiquette of the game, basic opening bids, playing the cards and scoring. This is followed by 6 lessons where both partnerships are involved in the bidding and these topics will be reinforced during supervised play.

INTERMEDIATE CLASSES:

Monday Evening starting 4th March, 2013 7pm – 9.30pm with Liz Zeller

Liz will be introducing more advanced lessons covering 2 Over 1, Weak Twos with an emphasis on understanding the rationale behind the bidding and improving card play. Program to be announced.

SUPERVISED PLAY:

Wednesday morning until Beginner Classes start.

8.45am for 9am start with Ian Jesser.

Ian will be focusing on movements, use of the bridgemates, as well as help with the bidding and card play.

In the Zone

Queensland Open Teams

Two teams from the Darling Downs Zone qualified to play in the two day Queensland Open Teams hosted by the Toowong Bridge Club on 25-26 August. There were 32 teams competing, and it was a veritable who's who of Queensland bridge.

One zone team was formed at the last minute, comprised of Byron Longford, Carol Wilson, Laurie-Marie McRoberts and Phil Dobney. They performed very well placing 21st with 3 wins and 5 losses in a very strong field.

My team of Chris Snook, Mohan Trada, Edwin Willey and Ian Jesser had a much tougher time of it but still recorded 2 wins, despite illness making most of the team look like the walking wounded.

Queensland Open/Novice Pairs

Our zone also supported three pairs to play in the State Open Pairs Championship on 20/21 October. Edwin Willey & Bruce Meakins, Byron Longford & Denise Hartwig and John & Valerie Rose (from Warwick) all had a wonderful experience playing against the state's top players, but it is a very strong field to try and bring home silverware or prize money.

The QBA also run a separate novice section, but it was disappointing to note that there were only 6 pairs competing. Many of our novice pairs would do well in this field and I encourage you to consider playing in the event next year.

Grand National Open Teams

The GNOT National Final was held at Tweed Heads last weekend. The team from the Darling Downs Zone (Chris Snook, Mohan Trada, Edwin Willey and Bruce Meakins) fared reasonably well coming away with 3 wins, 2 draws and 5 losses.

Mohan says that to do well in such competitions "you have to play well and your opponents have to play poorly". It is a simplistic view but very true! Whilst we showed the occasional flash of brilliance (in my opinion, anyway) the opponents didn't seem to make a mistake the whole time we were there, so there were no gifts for us.

Grand National Pairs

Toowoomba Bridge Club hosted the Zone Final of the GNP on Sunday 11 November with 23 pairs competing. I don't think I have ever had an even number of pairs for this complex event – a sitout was most unfortunate. Run as a two-session match-point event, the top two pairs were Ian Jesser & Rhondda Dean and Byron Longford & Col Hutton. Both pairs now proceed to the National Final to be held in Canberra in January. We wish them well.

The ABF have decided not to continue this event after January, so if you are still on the quest for more gold masterpoints, then I suggest playing in the novice or intermediate fields at the Gold Coast Congress at the end of February. It is one of the worlds to bridge competitions – right on your doorstep.

Dealing with Strong 3-suited Hands by Edwin Willey

Strong three-suited hands are often difficult to describe in most systems and thus perhaps deserve special attention. Some agreements have ways of showing them, e.g. multi-two 2D openers include such an option, which are shown at the three-level. With some of my regular partners, we use a 2D* opener which only shows a strong 3-suiter. It is a green system and typically shows 17-22pts with any 4441 or 18-22pts any 5440 or 20-22pts any 5431. Responses are an indication of length of suit holdings: 2H* only 4-card suits and 2S* 5+-card suit. Should opponents interfere, the two steps are PASS*(=2H) and X(=2S) over a suit call and PASS*(=2H) and XX (=2S) over a double. Openers rebids are 2NT* with either 4441 or 5440 and a suit-bid with the 5-carder in a 5431. From here the auction proceeds naturally.

The 2D* opener promises to keep the auction open until either partner passes or game is reached. This commitment by opener seems extreme; however, this is based on the high probability of responder holding 6+points. This would bring the combined point count of both hands to a minimum of 23, sufficient values for a major game, given a fit. Interestingly, from many years of experience, the 2D opener has consistently produced good results (even up to 7D) and never resulted in a poor one. If responder holds very poor values, the auction will rarely go above the three level, usually playing in a 4-3 or even 4-4 fit.

Such 2D openers do not arise often, in practice perhaps once in two hundred deals. Very occasionally, they may turn up more often as they did in the Tuesday night session on 10 July (Boards 14, 18 and 26).
