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Presidents Report



The most significant thing I have to report is that the solar panels have been installed and connected to the grid.

What has staggered me is the amount of electricity

the club uses on a daily basis.

For example, on Wednesday the 27 November our consumption was 169.32 kWh, and for that week, the total was 648 kWh. That exceeded what I use at home in one month!

The solar panels produced 594 kWh in the same period.

So clearly the solar panels will reduce our electricity bill significantly.

Well done to Tim Porter for investigating the viability of solar panels and then following up with obtaining quotes from different providers and seeing it through to the final installation.

Tim has also been busy organising the rearrangement of the shelving for the library and Bridgemates.

There appears to be universal agreement that the new layout is a considerable improvement. There should be no excuses now that everyone can reach the book that they want from the library to help them improve their bridge.

We finally rearranged the position of the photos and shields in the foyer to enable the notice board to also be attached to the wall, rather than sitting on the easel waiting for an accident to happen. Hopefully this has made movement in the foyer easier for all members.

A big thanks to Henry Eastment, for arranging the updates to our various shields and boards.

I should also thank all of volunteers, the gardeners, the kitchen helpers, the board dealers, and especially our wonderful directors. The club would not function without you.

Finally, to all of our members, I wish you a merry Christmas and a happy new year, and I hope to see you at the bridge table next year.

He was a scholar and a gentleman – we will miss him greatly.


Three Wise Women

VALE PHIL DOBNEY

1930 - 2019



Dr Philip Dobney founding was a of the member Toowoomba Bridge Club, served as Club President 1985-1988, Zone Rep. Committee member and was a Club Director until he retired from bridge in 2012.

I was absolutely astounded when his daughter Louise sent me a brief overview of his life. His sporting achievements in chess, life-saving, table tennis, golf, squash saw him winning State titles and club championships. This was also reflected in bridge where he won 4 Congresses, the club Singles Championship and represented S E Qld in the 1990 GNOT.

His working life was equally as prestigious. Having left school in Yr 11, he completed Officer Training School and served as 2nd Lieut training National Servicemen, worked for Qantas as a flight attendant then at the age of 25 completed his matriculation and began his very prestigious academic career with a Certificate of Teaching, Batchelor of Science with Hon and Doctor of Philosophy. His main fields of interest being Magnetic Resonance, Atmospheric Science, Computer Managed Learning and Personalised Student Instruction. Before he retired he was the Principal Lecturer for the Faculty of Engineering & Surveying at USQ.I was quite sad when Phil decided to stop playing bridge – as you can imagine he was a no-nonsense Director but could also be very kind when needed. And I missed him playing Devil's Advocate at AGM's which I think he rather enjoyed.

What a truly extraordinary man.

Help Suit Game Tries

Help Suit Game Tries

- 1. You open one of a major and partner raises your major to the two level. Sometimes, as opener your decision to pass, invite or bid game is clearcut. Other times, it is useful to consult partner. The placement of partner's cards is often more important than his HCP holding.
- 2. It is most effective to use HSGT under the following conditions:
 - You have an intermediate hand 15-18 HCP opposite a simple raise of your major suit
 - You have a weak suit at least three long and missing both ace and king (at least two losers).
- 3. Here is an example:

Partner	You	Your Hand
	1♥	♠ A K Q
2♥	3♣	♥ A Q J 9 3
		♦ 8
		♣ Q 4 3 2

- 4. Here you need help in clubs. You want to be in game if partner has:
- **♦**653 **♥**K754 **♦**654 **♣**KJ7

But not if he has:

- **♦**653 **♥**K754 **♦**KJ7 **♣**765
- 5. Let's look at another example:

Partner	You	Your Hand
	1♠	♠ A K Q 9 6
2♠	3♥	♥ 5 4 3
		♦ 10
		♣ K Q J 10

- 6. Here you need help in hearts, and middle honours in diamonds will be of no use at all.
- 7. **Responding to HSGT**. You are not being asked if you have a good or a bad hand for your single raise, only if you have the right kind of help, as follows:

- If you have length in the help suit, then you need a concentration of values in it, e.g. K
 J 5 4 or A 10 7
- Shortness in the help suit is useful if you have 4+ trumps so that partner can ruff his losers.
- 8. With help, jump to game in the major. Without help, sign off in three of the major. Here are two examples:


Note: With no heart support, sign off in 3♠.

Partner	You	Your Hand
1♠	2♠	★ K 9 8 3
3♦*	4♠	♥ 10 7 4
		♦ A J 5 4
		♣ 8 2

Note: This is the same hand, but partner now needs help in diamonds. With strong diamond support, jump to game in spades.






Easy one for Lyn and Desley.

Bridge Quiz



South is in $6 \triangleq$ with no E-W bidding. West leads the $4 \checkmark$. Plan the play – West holds three spades. (Cover up the solution below).



Losers: 1 club and 1 spade with a bad break.

Win the \P A, then cash \clubsuit A and \clubsuit K and discover the bad break. The plan then is to eliminate the heart and diamond suits and put West on lead so they have to lead clubs, hoping that they hold the \clubsuit K. So play the three winning hearts, then \blacklozenge K, \blacklozenge Q and a third diamond to the Ace. Had the diamonds behaved and split evenly, declarer could've discarded the club loser on the extra diamond winner. When the diamonds provide no joy, declarer needs to exit with a third trump to put West back on lead.


Now West has the choice of either leading away from the \clubsuit K, to which declarer would play the \clubsuit Q and win, or he can lead his remaining heart, which would give declarer a ruff-and-discard, as there are no hearts left in either hand. Either way, the slam is home.

If West had turned up with four diamonds, South would ruff the fourth diamond and then exit with a trump to put West on lead.

A Bit of Bluff

I have recently been reading *Master of Bridge Psychology* by Jeppe Juhl. It features a number of hands played by Peter Fredin, a world class player who seems to have made a career out of exciting play and outlandish bluffs. One of these hands is below. The type of dilemma facing East is one that many novices face and are often quite unsure what to do. Fredin is playing South.



The bidding went as follows:

West	North	East	South
			1♠
Pass	2 ♠	3♣	3♥
Pass	4 🆍	5♣	5♠
Pass	Pass	Pass	

West led the ♣2 to the ♣Q and East's ♣K. East continued with the ♠K to Fredin's ♠A. There are two losers, one each in clubs and diamonds but the danger was of course the Spade K. Looking at the hand I would have thought that South should cross to dummy and take the spade finesse – the odds surely would be that East having been a spirited bidder would hold the ♠K. However, Fredin reasoned that because East had not hesitated when bidding 3♣ he must have held something like ♠Kx, ♥xx, ♠KQ, ♣AKJxxxx, otherwise he would have at least considered 3NT. Therefore, at trick 3 he led the ♠J from his hand. What does West do? Many a novice would rise with the ♠K. However reasoning from the bidding that South surely held 6 Spades, that would mean there could only be one Spade in East's hand (if in fact he held a spade)- but what was it? Lots of us have faced the situation where we play high (in the second hand) only to see our partner having to play the A on our K. West, wise to this dilemma, ducked and played the S3 arguing that even Fredin would not lead the J from the Ace-Jack. When the J held, Fredin cashed the ♠A and claimed 12 tricks! What a mind.

Masterpoint Secretary's Report

Total masterpoints earned in the club over the past few months were:

A total of 1911.12 green points was earned by players in our club in the ABF census period of 1st Oct 2018 – 30th Sept 2019, which entitles us to 36 red masterpoint sessions in 2020. This is up from 1711.91 green points and 32 red sessions the previous census period. Comparing the two census periods, our total number of tables has increased from 4723.5 to 5215.5, an increase of 10%.

Members are reminded that the number of masterpoints you earn is based on the total number of tables in your section, the status of the event (supervised, club, red points, gold points and congresses) and your position in the top half of the field. Some of the red and gold point calculations can be complex, so masterpoints displayed on our noticeboards or website are provisional until approved at the end of each month.

If you feel that you are missing some masterpoints, check with the Club Masterpoint Secretary in the first instance, advising of the date and session that you played in, who your partner was and who the Director was. If you think you are missing points from an event, then tell me the event name and date. If you added up the points you think you might receive, and the actual amount is different, then tell me the points/events you think you did achieve. Remember that I only process club masterpoints. Those from congresses, nationwide pairs and other events are done by other people, usually months later.

Session Rules Reminder

- Players should be <u>seated</u> 10 minutes prior to the start of play for a session.
- The Director makes the final decision on seating arrangements and on playing arrangements in the room (e.g. windows, air-conditioning).
- Only **green** and **blue** systems are permitted in club events.
- System cards are compulsory for competitions and red master point events and strongly recommended for all other sessions.
- NS are primarily responsible for the playing conditions at the table (bridgemates, management of boards and moving them if instructed to do so by the Director).
- EW are primarily responsible for tidy up and leaving the table in a good condition ready for the next session.
- All players should offer to help with general room clean-up to assist the Director.
- No notices are permitted on the noticeboards unless approval is given from the Management Committee.
- No trading is permitted on the club premises unless written permission is given via the Management Committee.
- Smoking is only permitted in the Designated Smoking Area or in the parklands off the premises.

Director Training Workshop

In January, we will resume our monthly lesson/workshop for people keen to train as future Directors. The first one will be on Laws pertaining to basic bridge housekeeping matters, and this will also be relevant to most players.

The workshop time will be determined by our current Trainee Directors.

Alerts and Announcements

Players appear to be getting lax in alerting their partners calls or announcing when the Regulations require them to do so! Thus, it is time for another lesson in the correct procedure when playing duplicate bridge.

- 1. Bridge is not a game of secrets. All agreements must be fully available and fully disclosed to the opponents.
- 2. Regulations enforce this disclosure by requiring each player to have a legible approved system card on the table at all times [It should be accessible to the opponents without them having to move handbags, cups, bridgemates, etc].
- 3. Special cases require you to <u>announce</u> the basic meaning of specific calls. It is the responsibility of the responder to make a prescribed statement (otherwise termed an 'Announcement') whenever their partner opens either 1♣ or a natural 1NT. The form of the announcement required varies depending upon the nature of the opening bid:

(a) Announcements required after a 1♣ opening:

For Natural-type systems (e.g. Acol or Standard), the minimum length of the club suit (i.e. "1+", "2+", "3+", "4+") should be announced.

For Strong Club systems (e.g. Precision); the word "Strong" together with the minimum HCP holding (i.e. "16+") should be announced.

For systems other than those above (e.g. a Polish 14, which has multiple meanings), the word "Unusual" should be used.

(b) Announcements required after a natural 1NT opening:

The appropriate HCP range (e.g. "12-14" or "15-17" etc.) should be announced. These are the only words you say Nothing else.

- 4. Regulations also require a player to <u>alert</u>, which is a process to draw the opponents' attention to any call from partner that is <u>not a natural call</u>, or has a <u>special meaning</u>, or has a <u>meaning</u> the opponents may not expect.
- 5. The fact that the system card explains the meaning of a call does not remove the obligation to alert it when required by these regulations.

- 6. Players should adhere to the principle of full disclosure (as required by the Laws) in following these Regulations and in explanations of calls. The principle is to disclose, not as little as you must, but <u>as</u> <u>much as you can</u>, and as comprehensibly as you can.
- 7. Merely to name a convention (e.g. Michaels, Lebensohl, etc.) is not an acceptable explanation. There are many variations of most conventions, and a more specific explanation is normally required. Similarly, the use of "Standard" or "Natural" to describe calls, signals or leads is rarely sufficient nor are the terms "Weak", "Strong" or "Intermediate" without appropriate qualification.
- 8. A <u>conventional call</u> is a call that, by partnership agreement, conveys a meaning other than willingness to play in the denomination named (or in the last denomination named), or high-card strength or length (three cards or more) there. However, an agreement as to overall strength does not make a call a convention. Opening bids and overcalls that show two or more suits, even if one of the suits is named, are by definition conventional.
- 9. A <u>natural bid</u> is a call that is not conventional. It conveys a willingness to play in the denomination named and shows high card strength or (at least 3 card) length in the named suit. A <u>natural NT</u> conveys a willingness to play in NT and conveys no other information about particular suit holdings. A <u>natural pass</u> does not convey any message about suit nor playing strength.
- 10. <u>Self Alerting Calls</u> are sufficiently strange such that they carry their own alert and should not be separately alerted. These include:
 - (i) Doubles
 - (ii) Redoubles
 - (iii) Cue bid of the opponents suit that they called or the suit that they have shown (eg a transfer)
 - (iv) All calls at the 4 level or higher (except conventional opening bids)
 - (v) Any 2C response to a 1 NT opening in a non-contested auction.
- 11. Players alert their partner's calls, not their own. Alerts should be made immediately after the alertable call has been completed. Alerts are made by audibly saying, "Alert" and circling the call on the bidding pad. Circling a

call provides prima-facie evidence that it has been alerted.

Specific examples from the Club Standard American:

Opening 1C, our partner announces "three plus" because we play better minor. We don't say "better minor", we don't say "opening hand", we don't say anything else.

Opening 1D, our partner does not announce anything and does not alert because it is a natural call.

Opening 1NT, our partner says "15 to 17" They do not say balanced. They do not say anything else.

... 1NT - P - 2C, opener does not alert the 2C call because it is self-alerting, no matter what it means. In our beginner's system, we all know it means Stayman, but some other partnerships may have a different meaning. If the opponents need to know in order to make their call, then they should ask what the auction means.

Transfers 1NT - P - 2D, opener will alert the 2D call. If the opponents need to know what this means then they will ask and be told "it is a transfer to Hearts showing at least 5 and ...". We do not alert openers 2H call which completes the transfer, because it does not convey any information – they are just calling it because they were told to.

Specific examples when using "the short club" and extended Stayman:

Opening 1C, our partner announces "two plus" because we only promise two clubs in the hand. We don't say "prepared club", we don't say "short club", we don't say "could be short", we don't say anything else.

Opening 1D, our partner does not announce anything and does not alert because it is a natural call.

Opening 1NT, our partner says "15 to 18" They do not say balanced. They do not say anything else.

- ... 1NT P 2C, opener does not alert the 2C call because it is self-alerting, no matter what it means. We all know it means some sort of Stayman, but some other partnerships may have a different meaning. If the opponents need to know in order to make their call, then they should ask what the auction means.
- ... 1NT P 2C P 2H <alert> Responder alerts the 2H because it says I have 4 Hearts but now only 15-16 HCP.
- ... 1NT P 2C P 3H <alert> Responder alerts the 3H because it says I have 4 Hearts but now have 17-18 HCP.

Transfers with "super accepts".

- ... 1NT P 2D, opener will alert the 2D call which starts the transfer sequence. If the opponents need to know what this means then they will ask and be told "it is a transfer to Hearts showing at least 5 and ...".
- ... 1NT P 2D P 2H <alert> Responder would alert openers 2H call, because it shows additional information about the limited strength of the hand.

Specific examples with other systems/conventions:

- ... 1NT, Acol people will announce this as 12-14.
- ... 1NT, Toowoomba Precision will announce this as 14-16, and traditional Precision will announce this as 13-15.
- If 1C (1H) 1NT does not promise a stopper in Hearts then the 1NT must be <u>alerted</u>.

If you "can't leave partner on 1C because it might be short", then you are playing some form of Diamond Bust system, and if your partnership will respond to 1C with less than 5/6 points (typically 1D) then the response must be <u>alerted</u> so that the opponents are aware of your unusual system.

Opening 1D: <u>Alert</u> 1D if it may, by agreement, contain less than 3 diamonds. Of course, you should have also told the opponents when you first sat down.

I don't know of any Toowoomba folk who play this.

Precision 1D opening: This typically shows (11)12-15 HCP and no five-card major. It may or may not contain diamonds. There is no willingness to play in diamonds and the call contains other information thus 1D must be **alerted**.

Precision 1D response to 1C: In a Standard American auction 1C-P-1D, responder would show (5)6+ HCP and typically 4D+. The Precision 1D response must be **altered** because it is not a willingness to play in diamonds and is 0-7 HCP which most people will not expect.

Inverted Minors: In a normal auction that proceeds 1D-P-2D you would expect responder to have around 6-9 HCP's and if the auction proceeds 1D-P-3D for responder to have a fit in diamonds and 10+ HCP. If a partnership is playing "inverted minors" such bids are reversed so that 1D-P-2D shows 10+ and 1D-P-3D is a limited hand with 6-9. This is not what most people would expect and thus opponents might not compete in the bidding – thus the inverted minor response must be **alerted**.

Negative Free bids: Using traditional systems, responder requires (10)11+ HCP to bid at the two level after the opposition has interfered in the bidding.

eg 1H-(1S)-2C (the 2C bid shows 11+) or 1S-(2C)-2H (the 2H bid shows 11=). Some partnerships are playing "negative free bids" and their 2C bid is less than 10HCP and some partnerships will play down to 0 points. They usually have some other response (like a double first) to show a positive hand. These negative free bids are done on playing strength the opposition might not expect and must be **alerted**.

Weak Jump Responses: While not so common nowadays, a jump response used to show an opening hand opposite Openers hand, or at least is forcing to game. Other pairs play that a jump shift response shows a weak hand.

eg 1H-P-2S shows a very weak hand only worth playing in spades (it might be 0-4 HCP and 6 spades). This is certainly not what most people would expect and thus such weak jump shifts should be <u>alerted</u>.

Multi-two bids: Any 2-level bid with a multiple meaning is <u>alertable</u>. The conventional responses, including correctable bids are also <u>alertable</u>.

Strong 2C or 2D: Alert these strong artificial bids. Also alert any artificial responses such as "waiting bids".

Weak-twos: Do not alert a 2 level bid if it shows a single suit, no matter whether the bid is weak or strong (eg 2H showing 6 hearts).

Alert: Forcing 1NT response

Alert: Jacoby 2NT

Alert: Transfer bids below 4C

Alert : Unusual NT

I understand beginners make mistakes so Directors will be gentle if you try to comply with the Alert Regulations but make the occasional boo-boo. Experienced players, however, are expected to know and comply with the Alert Regulations at all times. If a conventional call is not alerted and the non-offending side's score could possibly have been damaged by the failure to alert, then the score will be adjusted in all cases.

[Home] The main page has nine buttons across the top of the page: [Home], [Sessions], [Results], [Calendar], etc.


Next on the left of this page is general information about the club of interest to visitors, and on the right are links to the weekly "Directors announcements', "breaking news" and "upcoming events".

"Individual History" is where you can search for your own name (or a friends) and see your recent results. Use the dropdown arrow to search for the "Player name". You can also look for a specific Partner if you wish.




"Grand Slams", as the name suggests, is a list of players who have bid and made a Grand Slam – and this is always a talking point after the round has finished.

Whilst on a bit of a nostalgia trip, I found this one !!!!




Denise and I were NS (which means I would have been North), but the contract was recorded as 7H by North making 13, when it was obviously bid and played by South. I guess that's why Denise doesn't let me use the Bridgemate anymore!

It was a heavily competitive auction, so all the usual bids and gadgets did not apply. It went something like:

2S: X: 3S: 4C: Pass: 4H: 4S: 5H: Pass: 6H: Pass: 7H

Have a chat with your partner(s) and see what you come up with.

A new feature on our results pages is the link "Replay with Bridge Solver". This link leads you to a page with all four hands showing. You can click on the little table in the lower left of the page and BridgeSolver will let you play the hand whilst showing the number of tricks each pair are likely to make as you play the cards. Give it a try.



"70% Club" shows a list of pairs who have achieved a session score of 70% or higher – which is always an impressive performance.

Now back to the Home page.

[Events] is where you enter the major club competitions and congresses, and is where you can see the list of entries at any point in time.

[**Documents**] lists other documents of relevance to most players, including our Rules of Association, By-Laws, Strategic Play for the club, membership information, honour boards, dates for Nationwide Pairs, and a brief history of the Toowoomba Bridge Club.

The last button [About Us] lists Management Committee and Office Bearers, and a list of links to other sites of interest such as the other clubs in our zone, the OBA, ABF and ABF Masterpoint Center.

From the Home page you can also access a link to Pianola where you can see results similar to the above, and if you login you can see considerably more detail about your playing performance. You can then also access the Partnership Finder page.

A quick look at my results reveals they are up and down like a yoyo. I fill-in with a lot of different players and we do sometimes have varying results all in the name of fun! I also note that sometimes I do get a high session score but can have an atrocious "bidding accuracy". I guess when you overbid you have to compensate by a stronger declarer play.
