Treasurer's Report for November 2024

For the period 1 August to 30 November this year we have recorded a deficit of \$385.70. \$25,349 income was generated from Table Fees plus \$19,767 from Congress entry fees. Interest of \$3,469.31 was paid on the 12-month term deposit. \$1,891.50 rent was received from the U3A Mahjong group for the period.

The shortfall is as a result of the following annual expenses which have been paid:-Auditor Fees \$2,112; AGM Honoraria \$3,670; Insurance \$3,864; GNOT Zone table fees \$1,110; plus, general expense of \$2,808 for repairs & maintenance; and \$2,559 for food & drinks after play.

Balance of accounts as at 30 November 2024

- Heritage Bank General Account \$12,681.98
- Term Deposit I6 (6 months) 4.65% matures 27 May 2025 \$70,000
- ABF funds held \$10,049

The term deposit was renewed for 6 months, and in the new year a separate interest-bearing account will be opened to facilitate the transfer of funds from increased table fees to be set aside for future capital expenditure.

The club members were very generous with their donations to the Salvation Army appeal this year. We were very pleased to hand over a cheque for \$1,497.50 for cash collected at our Christmas party. The cheque plus the many and varied hamper donations were greatly appreciated by the Salvation Army representatives

How the ABF Membership Renewal System works

The details below cover what myABF reports to the Club re Renewal status on a nightly basis. It also covers what is still required when your Renewal is still unpaid. Most of you had sufficient funds in your account or had auto Top-up enabled (our recommended approach) & these renewals were then automatic on the autopay date, this for most of you will have been in the last week, with the last batch being processed last night.

This is an extract from the report for those renewals successfully processed @ 10pm last night.




How the ABF Membership Renewal System works (cont)

This means that given the myABF issues you a receipt this has been a big step forward saving us significant time. No more chasing bank statements with missing details, writing out receipts, tracking who has paid, who is still outstanding etc. etc. From the start of 2025 you'll still be able to play, if your renewal has not been paid by then, and myABF will still process your session payments but given your membership will have lapsed it will treat your tables fees as a visitor. If you are unable to have these fees paid by the month end, please let Ngaire know so that we can take this into consideration.

This is our first year using myABF for Club renewals & whilst in future years they will automatically be sent early November & give you two months' notice, this has not been the case this year. Where needed, we'll certainly make allowances as need be, but please let us know thanks.

For those that have yet to pay, just a reminder your Renewal is due to be paid for by 31st December. For those of you who have not turned on auto Top-Up it is not a problem, but you will need to go to your account and do a manual top-up, just as you do now with your session payments when you have a low balance. The next evening, myABF will then automatically collect your membership fee

This is the extract from the report for those that did not have sufficient funds available from last night.



47 membership fee auto payments were unsuccessful.

Auto payment of these fees will be attempted again tomorrow.

For those few that have disabled autopay, the same process applies ie you'll need to top-up your account BUT you'll also need to select the Pay Now option, once you've ensured your account has sufficient funds to cover the renewal amount.

Note that as you have disabled autopay myABF cannot process your renewal automatically

WINNERS ARE GRINNERS

The "Monthly Winners" are recognised as the "individual" winner of <u>eclectic</u> multi-session events. These events combine of all the green masterpoint sessions in a month that have not already counted toward a competition. If there are three available sessions then your best two scores are counted (shows as 2/3), if there are four available sessions then your best three scores are counted (3/4) and if there are five available sessions then your best four scores might be counted (4/5). If there are two available sessions, then they are treated as an eclectic event (best 2/2). If there are five days in the month, then we usually combine two of these (see the bridge diary) as a "<u>Two-Weekly</u>" and additional masterpoints are awarded to the top half of those whose partnerships played both days. The remaining three days are scored as an eclectic with (2/3).

TOOWOOMBA BRIDGE CLUB 2024 PAIRS CHAMPIONS

A small, dedicated field played in the Club Pairs Championship on Sunday 10th November. There were 12 pairs playing in the Open section and 12 pairs playing in the Novice section. Will Higgins was our Director and did a splendid job whilst also playing. (Will was also filling in with Estelle Dehnert to give us an even number of tables, and they came 3rd in the process).

I looked after the movement and scoring, and these were ideal numbers such that we could play what is called a "Barometer Howell". All this means is the movement was a 6-table Howell playing eleven 5-board rounds. Usually, boards circulate around the Howell movement and this would have required boards numbered up to 55, and would present a great risk of people accidentally overhearing results from the morning session that they might encounter in the afternoon. To overcome this, Barometer scoring is done where all six tables play the same set of 5 boards during each round, and this means that theoretically we could calculate scores at the end of each round and display them (like a Barometer). We _could_ but I was playing and scoring, so was a bit too busy for that.

In the open section, John and Trevor H did well in the morning, hitting the lead after the 4th round. Bill and Elizabeth had a good afternoon and nearly caught John and Trevor H, but not quite, as John and Trevor H hung on for a well-deserved win. If you like data, you can see the scores and ranks after each 5-board round on our website.

In the novice section, it was a similar outcome, with Ian and Trevor C having a good morning, and seeing Yvonne and Trevor M catching up fast until Ian and Trevor C had a huge last round.

I just re-read the above. I know it is a gaggle of geese, a herd of elephants, a flock of sheep, but what do we call a collection of Trevors? To differentiate I've added family name initials

HAMILTON (CAPPELLETTI)

Intervening after a 1NT opening (particularly a strong 1NT) can be dangerous if a natural overcall is made with a balanced or semi balanced distribution. Competing against a 1NT opening has less to do with HCP than shape. While LANDY was one of the earliest conventional defences devised, since then there have been at least 50 conventions developed all have their strengths and weaknesses.

One of the more popular conventions played over a 1NT bid by opposition is Hamilton. Hamilton was devised by Michael Cappelletti (sometimes called the Cappelletti system) and while it is commonly known as Hamilton in western and central USA and Canada, it is known as Pottage in the UK.


Hamilton is a fairly complicated convention and takes a little bit of practice. Irrespective of whether you use Landy or Hamilton, always give due consideration to vulnerability, your position in relation to the 1NT opener, the strength of the 1NT and your partner's sense of humour!

Please note: :


- 1. When you first start playing bridge, you need to ignore advanced conventions such as Hamilton until you have the basics under control.
- 2. When you are responding to Hamilton, you need to factor in that after 1NT (15-17) and a Hamilton intervention (10+), there are only 13-15 HCP left outstanding between 2 players. If you have a tendency to gamble, you also need to factor in vulnerability.
- 3. A 5:5 shape with 10+ HCP is the equivalent of an opening hand.

CONGRESS CONVENORS'S REPORT

The Toowoomba Swiss Teams Congress was held on Sunday 8th December. It attracted 16 teams including four and a half teams from other clubs in Brisbane (Sunnybank, QCBC, and Toowong) and Caboolture. The Local teams were competitive with team Buckley and De Zoysa battling it out with outsiders Evans and Moses for 1st position. The Evans team started well behind but improved steadily through the day to take the 1st position with 3 rounds to go. Team Buckley started in the lead but fell away before regaining 2nd on the last round. In the A division, the place getters were Evans team 1st for QCBC – Ron Clark, Pamela Evans, James Evans and Janeen Solomon – taking home \$480. 2nd were the Buckley team – Local Jenni Buckley and Jim wood with visitors from Toowong- Alan Hamilton and June Glenn – winning \$320.

Prizes were also awarded in each of the B and C divisions.

Date Claimers


- Welcome Back Pairs: Wednesday Afternoon 1st January. This is just a normal Wednesday afternoon session, with the addition that I will organise some little treats for afternoon tea. If there are sufficient entries then the afternoon will be graded, otherwise we'll play as the one field.
- Toowoomba Under 500 and Novice Pairs congress: Sunday 19th January. See entry form for further details and enter via the events section on our website or direct to MyABF. We will play in two separate grades: Novice (players with fewer than 100 masterpoints) and Under 500 (not surprisingly for those players with fewer than 500 masterpoints). About 85% of our membership are below 500mp so just about everyone is eligible to play. It would be good if we had a decent crowd for our first congress of the year.
- Col Martin Shield: This is a pairs event that runs on Tuesday Nights in January and some of February. It is an eclectic event where you can play as often as you wish and your highest four scores from the six sessions are counted. Play starts at 7:00pm and we usually finish around 10:00-10:15. It is not a late night.
 - The event dates are January 7th, 14th, 21st and 28th January and 11th & 18th February (we have a week off at the start of February so our regular Tuesday folk can play in the Tuesday daytime event on that day or for those at the Gold Coast congress).
 - The event is named to honour our friend and long term member, committee member, Director and masterpoint secretary.
- **Autumn Top-Tail Pairs:** Tuesday 4th February. This is a new initiative where you enter as an individual, and the Director/Convenor will then assign partnerships with the top seed playing with the bottom seed, second seed with second bottom, etc. It is a fun day along similar lines to our recent Pro-Am events. This is a good way to meet new people in the club and to support our newer players being integrated into the club sessions.
- Club Teams Championship: Saturday 16th February (two sessions). There will be an Open and a Restricted/Novice section. Also, we are going to try a new event specifically for our Rookies (new players, those straight out of lessons and up to 10 masterpoints). It will be a one session event (eg just the afternoon) and I have called it a **Perfect Teams** event, where four friends nominate as a team and they will play three matches in the afternoon, playing one match with each team member. We will make sure there is plenty of support onsite to help you, but you will be playing normal bridge with your peers and will be gaining a Isome experience in a teams environment. Please support this new initiative.

All these events are listed on our website in the "Calendar" area, are usually listed on the website front page, often have a flyer on display in the clubrooms, and are announced by the Directors (should be at the start of each session). They are also mentioned on the TV announcements when these TV's are switched on. Despite this, word of mouth remains the best way to get people involved, so always make sure you gee-up your friends to play thanks Chris
