After the car park extension cost of \$122,000 which took nearly all our reserves that were built after the initial building project we now have \$25,000 in reserve in a Term Deposit. We also have just over \$30,000 in working capital.

We still need to be prudent in our spending, as our net income will probably not cover our depreciation at the end of the financial year.

Also, the management committee continues to review our insurance needs and in conjunction with the ABF I am happy to say the Club has adequate insurance.

Masterpoint Secretary

The past few months have been busy ones for your masterpoint secretary. Of course, this is good news as it means we are playing more bridge and it means you are earning more masterpoints!

In May, I processed 66 sessions/events yielding 174.27 green, 16.42 red and 48.00 gold masterpoints. The club has awarded 1259 green masterpoints since the ABF census date of 30th September 2011, up from 1204 at the same date the previous year.

Here is a little lesson for those who are chasing more masterpoints so you can achieve your next promotion. In regular matchpoint sessions, the number of tables determines the winner award. If you double the number of tables then you double the winner award. If you place second, then you earn 70% of the winner award. Place third and you earn 50%. Place fourth and you earn 33%. These awards are restricted to the top half of the field.

My advice if you want to increase your masterpoints:

- Win more often.
- Play more bridge.
- Invite friends so you increase the number of tables in a session.
- Play in Howell rather than Mitchell movements.
- Play in multi-session events (eg a two-weekly or a three-weekly event).
- Play in Congresses because these award red masterpoints at a higher rate than club sessions.

If you have a query in relation to masterpoints then the ABF says you should speak to your Club Masterpoint Secretary (that's me) in the first instance.


In the Zone

Grand National Open Teams

We ran our qualifying rounds for this event on Saturday 21st and 28th April with ten teams competing. The top two teams progress to the Zone Area Final that will be hosted by the Goondiwindi Bridge Club on 9th September. The winner of that event will represent the Darling Downs Zone at the National Final at the end of November. These winning teams were:

Here is an interesting hand that caused grief for a few teams:



With EW having 27 HCP, 3 aces, 3 kings and a void, six of the ten teams bid 6 spades.

The problem arises if South finds the 9 Hearts lead, and partner behaves by winning with the ace and returning the suit for a ruff 1 down! Four teams met this fate.

Of course, nothing is ever this easy, and some Souths couldn't help themselves by entering the auction and this was normally enough to temper Easts ambitions and an easy 4 Spade contract was found.

Have a chat to partner and see what you would do!

Queensland Open Teams:

Players from all zone clubs can play in the qualifying event held on **Sunday 17th June**. The top two or three teams are then supported to play in the State Championship on 24/25 August.

Queensland Open/Novice Pairs:

Players from all zone clubs can play in the qualifying event held on **Sunday 29**th **July**. The top two or three pairs are then supported to play in the State Championship on 20/21 October.

GNP (Grand National Pairs):

For players below Life master ranking.

Club Qualifiers are a three session event. Either:

Wednesday 4th, 11th & 18th July.

Saturday 4th, 11th & 18th August.

Many players then qualify for the zone final to be held on Sunday 11th November. Top two pairs then play in the national final in Canberra in January 2013.

Quite often now, because we don't have a lady to clean up, you will see her in the kitchen after afternoon tea helping with the clean up. She has never been provider but she is the one member that all our providors and by association the club has relied on.

There are still some members of our club, who seem to think because they have paid their membership fees and their \$5 table money, other people should clean up after them. Be it washing their cup or putting their rubbish in the bin. If everyone did that, the club would turn into a pigsty and eventually cease to operate. We have never in the past or now expected people who have mobility problems to put themselves at risk. That is just silly.

There are also members who believe this is a rich club, why should I have to do anything. One of the best days of my life was when Elizabeth began to come on Mondays for the clean up. For four years I ran supervised play and cleaned up the kitchen and now I am back doing it again. Do you honestly believe that if there was a workable alternative that I wouldn't have suggested it. Fair Work Australia, complements of Julia has now made employing some-one for 1-2 hours impossible. Apart from the minimum hours, we also have to pay superannuation, workers compensation and so it goes on. Elizabeth was employed as a contractor with her own insurance, ABN and company structure and that rules out a lot of people.

Like Carmel, I don't mind helping because I know there will come a time, when I won't be able to do it. But I find it very difficult when some-one puts their cup down, and I ask them if they could rinse it out and they turn their nose up at me and walk off. Likewise if I ask a sit out to help and they roll their eyes at me, glare as if what right have I to ask.

The irony is at home I don't spend any time in the kitchen and like you, I also come to bridge to play and have a nice social afternoon. All I am asking is if you are unable to help, just get some-one else to take your cup in and if you can help, that would be wonderful. And while I am at it, a big thank you from Carmel and me to all those people who

do come in and help with the clean up. Without people like you our club wouldn't exist.

Policy of Zero Tolerance of Poor Behaviour

One issue that worries many of our members is the apparent poor behaviour of some players at the table. People come to the club to socialise and to play an enjoyable game of bridge, and we are committed to ensuring that this occurs.

For these reasons the Toowoomba Bridge Club (at its Management Committee meeting of 14th June 2012) has adopted a policy of Zero Tolerance of Poor Behaviour. A copy of the guiding principles of this policy is included in this newsletter. Full details can also be seen in By-Law 5.

Basically, examples of expected behaviour are listed, and examples of unacceptable behaviour are listed. If poor behaviour occurs at your table and it interferes with your enjoyment of the game, then you should call the Director immediately.

If the Director is satisfied that a breach of the policy has occurred then the offending player will be fined (eg their score for the session reduced) by 25% of a top on a board. This non-discretionary penalty equates to approximately 1% in the session. These penalties are a part of bridge and are covered by Laws 74 and 91. If a player commits a third offence at the same session then the player will be removed from the session and sent home. Any decision of the Director may be appealed (Law 92) but an appeals committee may not overturn a disciplinary penalty. They can, however, suggest that the Director change his ruling. We hope it never comes to this, but our policy covers the situation just in case.

This policy is not a draconian measure meant to upset our longstanding and faithful players. It has been adopted to encourage good behaviour so that we provide a safe and enjoyable environment for all of us.

Zero Tolerance of Poor Behaviour Policy

EXPECTED BEHAVIOUR

- 1. Greet players prior to start of play of each round.
- 2. Be a good 'host' or 'guest' at the table.
- 3. Do everything possible to make bridge enjoyable for yourself, your partner and your opponents.
- 4. Give credit when opponents make a good bid or play.

UNACCEPTABLE BEHAVIOUR

- 1. Criticising partner or opponents.
- 2. Badgering, rudeness, insinuation, profanity, threats of violence, violence.
- 3. Negative comments concerning opponents' or partner's play or bidding.
- 4. Discussing hands after the round is called.
- 5. Objecting to a call for the director.
- 6. Disputing a Director's ruling during the game. (Lodging an appeal is the appropriate action.)

PENALTIES

If the Director is satisfied that a breach has occurred, the offending player will be fined 25% of a board, or 3 IMPS. (If both partners are guilty, the fine will double.)

PROCEDURE

When unacceptable behaviour occurs, opponents should call the Director immediately, indicating that the player/pair are 'interfering with our enjoyment of the game.' (breach of Law 74 A)
