DON'T GIVE UP by Paul Marston

Mastering Bridge takes time. There are no overnight sensations. Everyone must first serve an apprenticeship. This is because learning Bridge is more about getting the hang of it than it is an intellectual exercise. You have to get a feel for the cards. The problem is complicated because some of the cards are hidden, forcing you to think about risk management.

I often see clever people acting frustrated with their slow progress. They should realize that no one has become a major force without five years' experience. Even young bridge players who start in their late teens or early 20's, few make it before their mid-20's.

Former World Champion, Mike Lawrence, once said it was not until he had been playing for three years that the fog suddenly lifted. For no apparent reason he could suddenly see how the game worked. **Don't give up.**

RECAP OF MAINTENANCE SINCE 2020 TIM PORTER



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Repainting: The building had been occupied in 2007 and after 12 years was beginning to show a little wear and tear. There was some obvious deterioration in the wooden trims along the façade. After repairing these, it seemed obvious that the outside needed repainting. During the COVID downtime in 2020, we were able to also achieve a repaint of the inside.

Lighting: During 2021, some of the original recessed fluorescent light fittings in the playing rooms needed attention. It proved difficult to obtain satisfactory replacements and the result was a number of light fittings that were very variable in their brightness. Eventually, we opted to replace all the lights with new technology in the form of LED low glare fittings, which have been very well received. At about this time also, several of the exterior lights failed. Again, these were difficult to reinstate individually and were all replaced with LED fittings similar to the originals.

Ventilation : During the Covid restrictions, we were prompted to give serious thought to whether the building had sufficient fresh air flow. Over some weeks in mid-2023, we recorded the CO_2 levels in the room. It acts as a proxy for the adequacy of ventilation. It was consistently well above recommended levels – reflecting the numbers present. Ultimately, we decided that an attachment to the existing air conditioners, known as Heat Recovery Ventilation, would achieve the best result. Two machines were installed in November 2023. CO_2 levels afterwards have been much more satisfactory.

Carpet: In mid-2022, a braided flexible hose attached to the vanity basin in the ladies bathroom burst, flooding the eastern half of the club. In the process of drying it out, the underfelt was removed and subsequently deemed beyond recovery. After some negotiation with our insurers, they agreed to pay for the half of the carpet that had been damaged. This allowed us to then replace the entire carpet in early 2023. The "new" carpet – now a year old – has recently been cleaned along with all the chairs and seems to be in good condition.

"Sinking Fund" An ongoing project I have been working on in spare moments, is to construct a chart of items likely to require repair or replacement and the likely timing of that and its expense. I hope it will act in the manner of a sinking fund to inform the club on the matter of how much cash reserve it should accumulate over the years. This in turn will provide a basis for deciding what level of table fees should apply.

Parking: Prior to the Covid Pandemic the Wednesday and Monday sessions had become very popular to the point that parking in the carpark had become very difficult. We had approached the Toowoomba Regional Council (TRC) with the thought that they might grant us access to more land for parking to the north of our current footprint.

Council representatives came to the site to review this. They ultimately declined our suggestion but offered as an alternative, that we might use the area immediately to the west - down the slope for overflow parking when required. It would align with our northern and southern boundaries and the new western boundary would be 30 m to the west. With the numbers playing on Wednesday and Monday now increasing again, this is proving very useful on those days. *Time*

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PROFILE NGAIRE WILLS



I was born in Charleville and lived there for four years until my father, who was a weather forecaster, was transferred to Sydney. After 18 months of city living, my parents bought a sheep and wheat property near Hillston in western NSW. My primary schooling was at a one-teacher school near my parent's property, and my secondary at Broken Hill.

My favourite song is "What a Wonderful World" by Louis Armstrong. Marie


BILL BRYSON'S TAKE ON AGEING

TIPS ON BRIDGE ETTIQUETTE

- 1. Always greet your opponents, introduce yourselves and tell them what system you are playing. If you are beginners "We are playing Standard American with a 15-17 NT' and if you like, "we are still learning our system". If you muck up the bidding, well people have been warned.
- 2. Count your cards face down before you look at them. If there are 14 in one hand and 12 in another, the Director can fix this, and you play on as normal. Sometimes a board cannot be played if the missing card was significant – say an Ace – and the person with 14 cards looked at their hand without counting. You may even be penalised for this. If the missing card is under the previous table, you may inadvertently renege you will not realise this until the 13th card is to be played and you don't have one. When the card is found, the Director will have to check how you played your hand to see if there has been a renege – and if so, your side will be penalised.
- 3. Prior to leading, you, as the person on lead, can ask for the auction to be explained. When you make the opening lead, always place the card face down – this gives your partner a chance to ask any questions about the auction.
- 4. When your partner as dummy puts his/her hand down, always thank him irrespective of how good or bad it is. When you make an adverse comment about dummy or your partner's bidding, you immediately alert the opposition that you are in trouble and make life uncomfortable for your partner.
- 5. Once you have played a card and turned it over, you cannot demand to see what the other players have played that round. But while your card is face up on the table, you can ask the opposition to show you what they played if their cards have been turned down.

- 6 You must agree with the opposition as to the number of tricks you have won or lost before you put the cards back into their pockets. If there is a disagreement about the number of tricks won or lost. ask your opponents if they would mind going through the cards – if they have a problem with this, you call the Director and let him sort it out. If it is shown that you were incorrect, always apologise – this is no big deal, better than feeling that you were cheated.
- Once a hand has been played, 7 congratulate the opposition if they have played well or commiserate with your partner if he/she went down "Bad luck partner". Unless your partner asks you, and really means it, as to how he/she could have made the contract – do not immediately tell him/her everything wrong about the play.
- 8 You must NEVER touch another player's cards under any circumstances. If you think the opposition have reneged during the play, when the hand is played, ask everyone not to touch their cards because you think there may have been a renege (you might be wrong) and call the Director who will sort it out.
- 9 When you finish a round, do not ignore the opposition and talk across them about the hands you have just played. If you want to do that, ask their permission or include them in the conversation.

Editor's Note: This article is not only aimed at our newer players who may not be aware of their rights - it is also aimed at some of our more experienced players who, while their focus is purely on bridge, need to be reminded sometimes that for most people, club sessions are also regarded as social outings.

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BRIDGE IS NOT A GAME OF SECRETS



The first (and as it turned out, the only time) I played against Tony Jackman was many years ago when congresses were not divided into levels. My partner and I knew he was a top Australian bridge player who had represented Australia, and we were horrified that we had drawn them in the first round. As it turned out, it was one of the most enlightening and enjoyable experiences I have had at bridge. He and his

partner knew we were way out of our league but rather than treat us like a couple of chumps, they went out of their way to make us welcome and on winning the contract and prior to us leading, they made a point of explaining not only what each bid meant but how many cards would probably be in each suit in dummy. This wasn't to show off or make us feel stupid but is part of the etiquette of bridge where, when you are declarer, the opposition are entitled to know as much as your partner.

Now theoretically, if the opposition don't know they can ask what the bidding means, there is certainly no obligation to tell them. But when your bids may have a different interpretation to what newer players are taught, for instance with weak jumps 0-6 –then it is a courtesy that you should make sure they know it is not strong.

The other point I would like to mention is when the opposition ask for an explanation of your partner's bid, and you don't know, it is not acceptable to say, "I am not sure, but this is what I am taking it for". That is, another form of cheating even though you don't mean to. Just say "I don't know" or "we haven't discussed this" or "I can't remember" - the opposition can then call the director and you will have to leave the table while he/she explains what their bid means.

Remember, bridge is not a game of secrets.

We have just covered checking that it is safe to bid Slam using Blackwood after suit has been called/agreed and Gerber after partner has shown a balanced no-trump call. Our responses are up-the-line, so after 4NT, 5C shows 0 or 4 aces, 5D shows 1, etc; and after 4C Gerber, responses are 4D shows 0 or 4 aces, etc.

If you play with one of these developing players, please use their system so they can practice what they have learnt.

- Toowoomba Under 500 and Novice Teams congress Sunday 16th June.
- **Graded Birthday Pairs** Tuesday 2nd July (it will be 17 years in our new building and 41 years for the Toowoomba Bridge Club Inc).

• **GNOT Qualifier** Wednesday Afternoons 10th & 17th July.

Teams event for gold masterpoints. Be part of a national competition (the only one where you can play in your own clubrooms). The top (contending) teams will advance to the Zone Final on 11th August competing against all the other clubs in our zone. The top two contending teams from our zone final advance to play online in the GNOT 64 Team Knockout in September. The top four teams nationally, plus the eight highest placed nonmetropolitan teams play in the national final in November. "Non-contending" means that you are eligible to play and earn masterpoints in a stage of the event but will not be advancing to the next stage (because of other commitments, disinterest in the next stage, already qualified via another mechanism).

Session Rules Reminder

- Players should be <u>seated</u> 15 minutes prior to the start of play for a session.
- The Director makes the final decision on seating arrangements and on playing arrangements in the room (e.g. windows, air-conditioning).
- Only green and blue systems are permitted in club events.
- System cards are compulsory for competitions and red master point events and strongly recommended for all other sessions.
- NS are primarily responsible for the playing conditions at the table (bridge mates, management of boards and moving them if instructed to do so by the Director).
- EW are primarily responsible for tidy up and leaving the table in a good condition ready for the next session.
- All players should offer to help with general room clean-up to assist the Director.
- No notices are permitted on the noticeboards unless approval is given from the Management Committee.
- No trading is permitted on the club premises unless written permission is given via the Management Committee. Smoking is only permitted in the Designated Smoking Area or in the parklands off the premises.
