Club Teacher's Report

PLANNING THE PLAY

When I was playing against Tony Jackman at the Darling Downs Congress, he told me about a wonderful new book from Canada called "Planning the Play of a Bridge Hand" by Barbara Seagram and David Bird.

I ordered a couple of copies for the library (no they are not in the library – Mary has one and I have the other).

It is really excellent and by Chapter 2, I was on a great learning curve. It is suitable for beginners and upwards, is simple to read and easy to understand.

So I contacted the Bridge Shop and asked what sort of a deal they would offer for an order of 20. The original books I ordered cost \$29.95 each, he has offered a bulk deal at \$24 and we would probably sell them at no more than \$25 once we have factored in postage costs.

As the bridge shop has run out, the new lot won't be arriving for a couple of months. If you would like to put your name down for one, please let me know and if there are more than 20 people, I will increase the order.

BRIDGE IS NOT A GAME OF SECRETS

Irrespective of what system you play, your opposition are entitled to know what your bids mean so they can offer a reasonable defence.

There are 3 people in our club that I know of playing a very unusual double jump after their partner has opened with very weak hands. In one case, the point count could be less than 6 points. I was told how well this works in stopping the opposition from bidding and I thought, of course it does, as long as they don't know your bid is actually weak. If you don't alert this bid or prealert the opposition before you start playing, this is in actual fact cheating.

If this happened, and the opposition called the Director saying they thought the double jump was strong, there is a fair probability that the Director would award an adjusted score changing the contract to what was most likely to have occurred if the correct information had been available at the table.

So if you want to play this, please pre-alert the opposition that a double jump by you after your partner has opened is weak.

Another problem is the Precision $2 \clubsuit$ bid after their partner has opened 1NT. This also needs to be pre-alerted before you start play. It is not a Stayman (which cannot be alerted now), but more likely it is a weak transfer to a 5 card or better suit with less than 8 points.

The other point I would like to mention is when the opposition ask for an explanation of your partner's bid, and you don't know, it is not acceptable to say I am not sure but this is what I am taking it for. That is actually another form of cheating. Just say "I don't know" or "we haven't discussed this" - the opposition can then call the director and you will have to leave the table while he explains what his bid means.

Remember, bridge is not a game of secrets.

Bridge Base Online

Bridge Base Online (BBO) was launched in 2001 by Fred Gitelman. It is the largest and busiest online bridge service available anywhere on Earth. Basic membership is free and the site offers duplicate play, tournaments and live broadcasts of bridge events involving world-class players with expert commentary. You can also purchase a broad range of quality bridge software at the BBO Online store.

BBO membership exceeds 100,000 and often there are over 10,000 bridge players on site at any one time. You develop your own profile and playing system. I use SAYC (Standard American Yellow Card) which involves a strong two club and weak two diamonds, hearts and spades. BBO also caters for other bridge playing systems such as Acol and Precision. You can then add other conventions such as Stayman, Gerber, Blackwood, Hamilton or Michaels cue bids.

You also make your personal assessment of your playing ability from novice, intermediate, advanced, expert or world-class. The quality of players varies as you would expect on such a large site. However, I would suggest that you exercise a degree of conservatism in this self-appraisal process. There are many players of exceptionally good quality playing on this site!



MELBOURNE CUP DAY



Once again our club will be hosting a Melbourne Cup Luncheon – this year on 3rd November. Make sure you don't miss this fun day.

Please place your names on the list on the notice board if you intend coming. Names are required as soon as possible for catering purposes.



Here is a fairly simple hand that I wrote about a while ago whilst explaining how to read the little Dealmaster analysis. I thought it worth repeating.

This is an analysis for board 3, and shows the hands held by each of North, East, South and West (North's looks pretty good). It also shows that North had 18 points, South had 4 points, East had 10 points and West had 8 points. Dealmaster does not consider the auction, it only shows the number of tricks that are possible for the computer playing double dummy (ie when it can see all the hands).

According to Dealmaster, North might expect to make 5 clubs, 6 hearts or 2 no-trumps. South might expect to make 5 clubs, 6 hearts or 2 notrumps. It also indicates that either East or West could make 3 diamonds. You can then compare this with what actually happened at your table.

I thought it would be an interesting exercise to look at how the bidding might actually proceed for the above hand using a couple of common bidding systems and approaches.

DUMMY'S LIMITATIONS

When declarer has won a trick and is thinking about his lead, all too often I see dummy indicating to declarer where the lead is to come from, by tapping the table if the lead is to come from dummy or pointing to declarer if the lead is to come from declarer. **THEY CAN'T DO IT!**

If declarer has started to lead from the wrong hand then Dummy can attempt to prevent the infraction. So, if declarer starts to take a card from his hand when the lead should be from dummy, then dummy could tap the table to indicate where the lead should come from; or if declarer starts naming a card from dummy when the card should come from his own hand, then if declarer had not finished naming the card (both suit and denomination) then dummy could point to declarer indicating where the lead should come from.

What should happen if declarer incorrectly plays a card from his own or dummy's hand and dummy was unable to prevent it? The Director must be called to explain the options for the defenders. Either defender can accept the incorrect lead but if one says "yes" and the other "no" then declarer must play from the correct hand.

LEARNING TO SCORE

The experts say that your success in Bridge depends on your bidding.

I once asked Paul Lavings "What can you say to players who continually complain that they never get enough honour cards (HC points) to do well. Paul said "Tell them that their bidding has to be improved!"

If you are to compete in the bidding you must know how to score. For example, if your opponents have bid (say) 3D and you have a reasonable hand, should you double for penalty or bid over the 3D? You need to know what the score will be if, for example, you double and they make 9 tricks when vulnerable.

If you bid on and become declarer and do not make your contract, then how will this compare with their score if you double and let them play in their contract. Could you quickly calculate 3DX making 9 tricks as 3x2x20 +500 +50 = 670 and quickly compare this to the score that they would get if you bid on over their 3D and went down by say 3 tricks, doubled, NV? (100 +200 +200 =500).

Remember you can't look at the "Instant Duplicate Scoring" cards during the Auction.

Just as you remembered all your "Times Tables" as a kid, to improve your Bridge you will need to remember scores, or know how to quickly calculate them.
