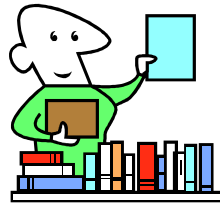


Club Librarian's Report

Solution to "A Challenging Hand"

The key element is for South to discard his/her Ace and King of diamonds. One can go on the A♠, but what to do with the other? The answer is to discard it on the last trump from Dummy. After South has ruffed two spades, his trumps will be shorter than North's. The play goes:

1. Win A♣ (discarding the 7♦).
2. Play a trump to A♥.
3. Ruff 7♠.
4. Play a trump to K♥.
5. Ruff Q♠.
6. Play a trump to Q♥.
7. Play J♥, drawing West's last trump and discarding the K♦.
8. Play A♠, throwing A♦ and North's hand is high.

North was on lead and, attempting to pluck the ♠4 out of his hand, accidentally dropped the ♠6. Notwithstanding North's expletive comment which followed and all players realising it was a mistake, the lead stood as North thought it was a penalty card and could not be picked up.

Declarer made 7NTX (scoring 2490). If North (who shall remain nameless) had called the director he would have been informed it was a minor penalty card and in the circumstances the lead could have been retracted. He could have led the card he intended and NS would have scored 1700. It was a rather expensive turnaround of 4190 points and a salutary lesson for not calling the director. After all, that is what he's there for. ■

Speeding up play

The perennial problem of slow play remains. Here are some tips to speed up everything else so you can take your time to play the cards:

1. **Move immediately this is announced by the Director.** This is the time to be sitting at the table ready to play the next boards and opponents. If an opponent is not there, sit anyway. We could almost guarantee that by the time you return they will have been sitting waiting for you.
2. **Tell the opponents your basic system and put your system card on the table.** Quite a bit of precious time can be lost by the opponents having to ask what your no-trump is or for you to go fishing in your handbag for your system card.
3. **Start bidding immediately.** As soon as all are at the table, position the board, remove and count your cards and start the auction.
4. **Don't put the pencil down after each bid.** You will need it again in a few seconds anyway for your next bid, so hang on to it. Besides we have a few compulsive tidy upperpers who might put it on the side table out of your reach. Also, there might be a claim that you have put your pencil down to signify that you want partner to realize you have nothing else to bid and you might hold the pencil to signify further interest.
5. **Make the opening lead face down asap.** If you are in charge of the Bridgemate then LEAD FIRST – then whilst other stuff is happening at the table you can enter data. Lead face down so that less time will be lost if you have attempted to lead out of turn. Still call the Director but their explanation will be a lot shorter.
6. **Put dummy down asap.** If you are in charge of the Bridgemate then put down dummy and then enter data.
7. **Agree on the number of tricks before gathering your cards.** If there is later dispute on this it can take quite a few minutes to reconstruct the hand especially if you need to call the Director.
8. When you have finished playing all your boards, **stack them in order in the middle of the table** (or elsewhere if so instructed by the

Director). This makes it quicker and easier to move boards, and lets the Director see from afar if you have finished the round.

9. Do not start bidding a board after the three minute warning bell. Call the Director and let them decide what to do. This has always been a club rule.
10. When (8) is complete, you may choose to quietly discuss the hands provided you do not berate partner or yourself, nor talk over the opponents as if they were not there. Or you may go get a drink, etc.
11. If you are running a bit late, then speed up to catch up! Don't take your time because another table looks slow or because someone arrived late to your table.

If we all follow these simple steps, we will reduce the problems with slow play and all enjoy our bridge more.

Bridgemates

I've been working with Peter Busch (the writer of our scoring software) to extend the capability so we can score teams events using Bridgemates and produce appropriate results printouts. The most recent trial was on Tuesday nights and after a number of glitches it seems to be working a lot better. The process is more complicated than a regular pairs event so please be tolerant if your Director takes time to set up the session.

A side effect of this was a forced upgrade of our software late on a Tuesday night (aka Wednesday morning) and in the process the option to show percentages was not enabled (it is off by default and we are one of the very few clubs that show percentages) and this was not realized until into the first round of the Wednesday session later that day when it was too late to change. There were some queries about the lack of percentage but most people expressed that it is a nicer and faster game without them. Thus the Tournament Subcommittee has decided to leave this option switched off at present.



What Makes a Club Special

Someone takes the boards and bridgemates back, someone empties the rubbish, someone straighten up the chairs and someone else sharpens the pencils and fills the bidding pad for the next session. This would only take a minute or two and would make an enormous difference.

If you notice the rubbish bins are over-flowing, perhaps take it out to the wheelie bin. Believe it or not, Ralph is not the designated rubbish man. I know he does it and bless him for it – but he won’t be deprived of a job if other people do it occasionally. And if you have a spare five minutes at the end of play, it would really help to have the dishwashers emptied and ready for the next session. Perhaps the Director of the day should nominate people for that job, because I know most people would be happy to do it.

Now having said all that, I would now like to compliment those people who have taken it on themselves to offer their time with little or no recognition because quite honestly, the club would not function without you. By the way, our lovely President said this article is much too growly and should not be published and he probably has a point. Because as I mentioned before, I know that if you ask most of our members, they are more than happy to help.

So the moral of this little story! We have a club with a great atmosphere and wonderful amenities which will only get better and better. And to parody those famous words from John Fitzgerald Kennedy - It is not what your Club can do for you, it is what you can do for your Club that makes a Club special.
